Please create a presentation of your school via any of the following forms: Power Point, Google Slides, Padlet, Infographic, Prezi or if there is another form you are familiar with and can answer the criteria properly, feel free to use that.

- 1. Where was this Indian Residential School located? (Did it move to additional locations? If yes, include each location.)
- 2. What are the years that this IRS was operational?
- 3. What church or other organization operated this IRS? (Was it operated by more than one church or organization? If yes, what years was it operated by each church or group?)
- 4. Upon whose traditional territory was this Residential School built?
- 5. What were the conditions like at this IRS?
- 6. Find stories specific to this IRS. (these could come from survivor testimony, newspaper articles, reports, books, memoires, etc.)
- 7. What kind of abuses did the children suffer at the school?
- 8. Why was the IRS created? What was its purpose? Was it successful?
- 9. What is your opinion of the treatment of Indigenous students while at these schools and what still needs to be done today to help the reconciliation process.

Your project must contain the answers to all of these questions and must include titles, graphics and pictures to help illustrate your description of the school.

You must include a list of sources (minimum 3 – no Wikipedia) in MLA format used in the research of your project.
