The new Social Studies 9 curriculum focuses on the development of Canada – past, present and future.

It is the hope that students will learn more about themselves, each other, and about the world we live in as well as how Canada has been influenced by various ideas, environment, power and identity.

The Socials Studies 9 curriculum provides students with opportunities as future citizens to critically think, analyze, and reflect upon events and issues in order to examine the present, make links with the past, and consider the future.



Curricular Competencies: Students are expected to be able to do the following:

- Inquiry processes and skills to ask questions; gather, interpret, and analyze ideas; and communicate findings and decisions (research)
- Assess the significance of people, places, events, or developments, and compare varying perspectives on their historical significance (significance)
- Assess the justification for competing historical accounts after investigating points of contention, reliability of sources, and adequacy of evidence (evidence)
- Compare and contrast continuities and changes for different groups at the same time period (continuity and change)
- Assess how prevailing conditions and the actions of individuals or groups affect events, decisions, or developments (cause and consequence)
- Explain and infer different perspectives on past or present people, places, issues, or events by considering prevailing norms, values, worldviews, and beliefs (perspective)
- Recognize implicit and explicit ethical judgments in a variety of sources (ethical judgment)
- Make reasoned ethical judgments about actions in the past and present, and determine appropriate ways to remember and respond (ethical judgment)


Textbook: Crossroads: A Meeting of Nations – (E-Version: rtaggart.weebly.com – Socials 9)
